Thank you to all the participants who took part in this project and whose creativity blossomed in creating such thoughtful and striking art work under the guidance of artist, Marion Barry Fitzgerald. The messages and feelings behind the art pieces have now been explained in this booklet with the assistance of writer, Mary Bradford. The 'Lives' exhibition highlights the reality of lived poverty in Ireland today and also worldwide. It emphasises that poverty is not just a financial issue, but is something real and experienced in our own communities in many forms. The art works remind us that the impacts of poverty experienced both at home and worldwide are comparable, such as isolation, social exclusion, health, hunger, housing and deprivation.

Through working together and continuing to raise awareness we hope that this exhibition will support the fight to eradicate both local and global poverty through small and large actions. Key to our message is an emphasis on human dignity, and the importance of individual's and government's commitment to fundamental human rights.

# 1. "Haywire" Mary Margaret Vallence

Acrylic



When we were asked to create a piece depicting poverty, all sorts of ideas went through my head. I decided to use splashes of colour which for me resembles the chaos around us.

There is a lot of unrest in our world, with people fleeing war torn countries resulting in a major loss of life. We also have global warming.

Ireland has been hit hard by the economic downturn and many of our young people have immigrated. With people losing jobs, homes being repossessed, Bono's quote 'let poverty be history' is a long way off.

## 2. "Empty Vessel" Imelda O'Riordan

There are many forms of poverty that people can experience. I have witnessed the most extreme cases on my trips to Africa. I have tried to capture the innocence of the child in my painting. The little boy was sitting in the red sands, various items of rubbish were scattered around him.

He was dressed in rags and playing with an empty plastic bottle. He lifted the crushed container to his mouth but there was no drink for him. I exaggerated the size of his eyes as this is what I saw looking at me. I also tried to capture the dryness of Africa and the importance of clean water for survival.

3. "Under Pressure" Breda Heelan

Poverty to me is a very personal thing as there are so many roads leading from it. This project, although about poverty, I found it empowered me to cope better with personal difficulties.

For my piece, I placed overdue utility bills on the base, then I put a purse made from Plaster of Paris. Next I had money flying out from the purse demonstrating how hard it is for people who are under financial pressure.

I loved doing this project. It gave me a sense of achievement and I also got to work with materials I never used before.

### 4. "Why Me" Helen Hogan

This relates to the poverty which is so often a part of domestic abuse and which can prevent women and children from leaving abusive situations. While in the abusive relationship, income and expenditure can be closely monitored, even down to petrol consumption, and use of light and heat at home. Yet those who experience violence and abuse within a relationship may be afraid to leave as poverty and homelessness are risks in leaving home.



# 5. "Red Tape" Pauline Dore

I feel that bureaucrats' spend too much time trying to decide where food aid is going to, so that by the time the starving receive it, it is too late for many of them. If it were not for all the red tape, many more people would survive famines and droughts in my opinion. There is food available, it just takes too long to get to those in need.

7. "Worn To A Thread" Pauline Kennedy

Since I do a lot of knitting, I decided to knit a jumper. I put some holes and left loose threads in the garment as I went along. I think it represents poverty very well. My piece depicts the misery and poverty of blindness at the bottom of the painting. The figure of the girl represents a person who has had a sight saving operation and the joy of being able to see the tiny butterfly at her fingertips.

5 Child Poverty. 6 The tap – water charges. 7 Living below the bread line.


I was pleased to be able show my ideas on poverty through my love for the craft of crochet.

## 21. "Global" Norah Theresa Fennessy




28. "Left Behind" Anne Cahill
