# Leave No One Behind!





As we mark UN Day for the Eradication of Poverty this October 17th, we recognise the special significance of 2015 in what must be our collective effort to eradicate global poverty. This year marks a decisive moment in history, with the agreement of the UN Sustainable Development Goals "Agenda 2030" in New York in recent weeks, and what will hopefully be a successful outcome at the COP21 Climate Change Summit in Paris at the end of the year.

Delivering on the promises to end inequality contained in Agenda 2030 will require concerted political commitment and it is essential that the central role of the State as the guarantor of the human rights of citizens is retained. It is also essential that economic forces are harnessed to serve the requirements of social justice and human rights, rather than the interests of justice being seen as residual to the demands of the market. At the individual level, we must recognise that sustainability and equality will require changes in lifestyle, patterns of consumption and attitudes.

"Leave no-one behind" is a central principle of the Agenda 2030 Goals and we are, above all else, called upon to re-forge a commitment to the inherent and universal dignity of every member of the human family. As we gather on this day, the world is turning its efforts and its capacities more fully than ever before to eradicate poverty – let us all play our part in turning that dream into a reality.

## Listening to unheard voices

On 17 October 1987, in the presence of 100,000 activists, Joseph Wresinski, founder of the International Movement **A**ll **T**ogether in **D**ignity — ATD Fourth World (<a href="www.atdireland.ie">www.atdireland.ie</a>), unveiled a Commemorative Stone on the Trocadero Human Rights Plaza in Paris.

On this marble Wresinski's call is engraved:

"Wherever men and women are condemned to live in poverty, human rights are violated. To come together to ensure that these rights are respected is our solemn duty."

Since then, this commemorative stone has become a rallying point for people from all walks of life. 17 October was declared "International Day for the Eradication of Poverty" by the United Nations in 1992.

The 17 October 2008 saw the unveiling of a commemorative stone on Custom House Quay near the Famine Memorial in Dublin.



On the 17 October every year, we come together in Ireland and around the world in friendship and solidarity with those who face chronic and severe poverty, honouring their struggles and renewing our determination to work for a world where everyone's human rights and human dignity are respected.

The **2015** call of the Day, "Building a sustainable future", underlines that a sustainable world cannot exist when there is poverty, discrimination and abuse of human rights. This year, the #EndPoverty Day holds particular significance because it is following following as it does the adoption of the **17 Sustainable Development Goals** by the United Nations on 25 September 2015. Within this new development framework all countries commit to "ending poverty in all its forms and dimensions" (Goal 1) by 2030. 



## A Human Rights Framework and 17 Goals



In September 2012, the UN Human Rights Council adopted the Guiding Principles on Extreme Poverty and Human Rights (GPs). The GPs provide global policy guidelines focusing specifically on the human rights of people living in poverty. They are the first internationally agreed text to stress the central message of the UN Day on 17 October: extreme poverty exists in every country in the world, and it is both a cause and a consequence of multiple human rights violations.

On 25 September 2015, after crucial work by the Irish Ambassador at the UN, world leaders have agreed to 17 Global Goals to achieve major transformations in the next 15 years: **end extreme poverty, fight inequalities and injustices, limit climate change and protect the planet.** The historic 17 Global Goals for Sustainable Development can make all this possible **in all countries and for all people.**
