

Listening to Unheard Voices

On 17 October 1987, in the presence on 100,000 activists, Joseph Wresinski, founder of the international movement All Together in Dignity (ATD) Fourth World (www.atdireland.ie) unveiled a commemorative stone on the Trocadero Human Rights Plaza in Paris. On this marble stone, Wresinski's call is engraved: "Wherever men and women are condemned to live in poverty, human rights are violated. To come together to ensure that these rights are respected is our solemn duty."

Since then, this commemorative stone has become a rallying point for people from all walks of life. 17 October was declared "International Day for the Eradication of Poverty" by the United Nations in 1992.

17 October 2008 saw the unveiling of a commemorative stone at Custom House Quay near the Famine Memorial in Dublin.





The Human Rights and Poverty Stone was inaugurated on 17 October 2008, the UN Day for the Eradication of Poverty. It was created by the Irish sculptor Stuart McGrath.

17 October Stones can be found in over 50 meeting places worldwide. They all bear the pledge of Joseph Wresinski (1917-1988), initiator of the United Nations' Day for the Eradication of Poverty. The first Stone was inaugurated on 17 October 1987 by Wresinski in Paris, at the Trocadero Plaza of Human Rights and Liberties.

Annually, on 17 October, citizens from all walks of life come together here. They fisten to people who experience poverty and discrimination in their daily lives. Together they commit to action for change and for justice.

May the message of this Stone be an inspiration every day.

I bear witness to you.



I bear witness to the millions of young people who have no reason to believe or even to exist, and who vainly search for a future in this senseless world.




Millions of men, women and children whose hearts are still pounding strong to the beat of the struggle, whose minds rise in revolt against the unjust fate imposed upon them, whose courage demands the right to priceless dignity.

I bear witness to you, children, women and men, who do not want to condemn, but to love, to pray, to work, and to unite, so that a world of solidarity may be born. A world, our world, in which all people would have given the best of themselves before dying.

I bear witness to you, men, women and children. Your renown is henceforth engraved by heart, hand and tool, in the marble of this Plaza of Human Rights and Liberties.

I bear witness to you, so that humanity may at last fulfil its true destiny, refusing forever that misery prevails.




THIS YEAR'S THEME

This year marks the 30th anniversary of the adoption of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) on November 1989.

This theme reminds us that our efforts to overcome poverty must address the fulfilment of all the rights of children as spelled out in the UNCRC. Childhood is a special time in everybody's life. It is a time when children should be encouraged to learn, play and develop physically and intellectually by their family and an extended community of adults in a safe and caring environment. Poverty hurts children's development and, in turn, leads to lower income health in adulthood.



For yourself, your children, your community, the world?


Write a message on the paper footstep and come display it along the End Poverty Walkway to the Famine Memorial as part of our symbolic gesture.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES ON EXTREME POVERTY AND HUMAN RIGHTS



"In a world characterized by an unprecedented level of economic development, technological means and financial resources, that millions of persons are living in extreme poverty is a moral outrage."

People living in extreme poverty are often neglected or overlooked by politicians, service providers and policy-makers due to their lack of political voice, financial and social capital and their chronic social exclusion. They are disproportionately affected by many human rights violations. Discrimination against people living in poverty is widespread and widely tolerated. In September 2012, the UN Human Rights Council adopted the **Guiding Principles on Extreme Poverty and Human Rights**. They provide global policy guidelines focusing specifically on the human rights of people living in poverty. It is the first internationally agreed text to stress the central message of the UN Day on 17 October: **extreme poverty exists in every country in the world, and it is both a cause and a consequence of multiple human rights violations.**
