

Listening to Unheard Voices



On 17 October 1987, in the presence of 100,000 activists, Joseph Wresinski, founder of the international movement All Together in Dignity (ATD) Fourth World (www.atdireland.ie) unveiled a commemorative stone on the Trocadero Human Rights Plaza in Paris. On this marble stone, Wresinski's call is engraved: "Wherever men and women are condemned to live in poverty, human rights are violated. To come together to ensure that these rights are respected is our solemn duty."

Since then, this commemorative stone has become a rallying point for people from all walks of life. The 17th of October was declared "International Day for the Eradication of Poverty" by the United Nations in 1992.

17 October 2008 saw the unveiling of a commemorative stone at the Custom House Quay, near the Famine Memorial in Dublin.

On the 17th of October every year, we come together in Ireland and around the world in friendship and solidarity with those who face chronic and severe poverty, honoring their struggles and renewing our determination to work for a world where everyone's human rights and human dignity are respected.



Joseph Wresinski's Address

(Initiator of the United Nations International Day for the Eradication of Poverty)

17 October 1987 – Paris

I bear witness to you.



You, the millions and millions of children, women and fathers who have died from misery and hunger and whose legacy we hold. It is not your death that I evoke, today on this Plaza of Human Rights and Liberties.

I bear witness to you, the mothers whose children are cast aside in this world, condemned as they are to sheer misery.

I bear witness to your children, twisted by the pains of hunger, no longer able to smile, yet still yearning to love.

I bear witness to the millions of young people who have no reason to believe or even to exist, and who vainly search for a future in this senseless world.

I bear witness to you, the poor of all times, still poor today, forever on the road, fleeing from place to place, despised and disgraced. Laborers without a trade, ever crushed by their toil.

Laborers whose hands, today, are no longer useful.



Millions of men, women and children whose hearts are still pounding strong to the beat of the struggle, whose minds rise in revolt against the unjust fate imposed upon them, whose courage demands the right to priceless dignity.

I bear witness to you, children, women and men, who do not want to condemn, but to love, to pray, to work, and to unite, so that a world of solidarity may be born. A world, our world, in which all people would have given the best of themselves before dying.

I bear witness to you, men, women and children. Your renown is henceforth engraved by heart, hand and tool, in the marble of this Plaza of Human Rights and Liberties.

I bear witness to you, so that humanity may at last fulfil its true destiny, refusing forever that misery prevails.

Global Theme for the UN International End Poverty Day 2020:


Acting together to achieve social and environmental justice for all.


The traumatic impact of the coronavirus pandemic in countries across the world has provided a stark reminder to us all of how inextricably linked the issues of social wellbeing for everyone and the wellbeing of our planet are.

Since the onset of the pandemic, it has been clear that the more fortunate have had more and better opportunities and resources to protect themselves. This contrasts sharply with the situation facing the less fortunate for whom such basic protections are weak or largely absent.

People living in extreme poverty, often through sheer necessity, are the first to act decisively within their communities in response to poverty, climate change and environmental challenges. However, their efforts and experience often go unnoticed and unappreciated; their ability to contribute positively to solutions has been overlooked; they are not recognized as drivers of change, and their voices are not heard, especially in international bodies.

This must change. The participation, knowledge, contributions and experience of people living in poverty and those left behind must be valued, respected and reflected in our efforts to build an equitable and sustainable world in which there is social and environmental justice for all.





MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT MICHAEL D. HIGGINS

I send my very best wishes to all those participating in this year's International Day for the Eradication of Extreme Poverty.



The theme of this year's International Day is a most important one, examining how we might achieve Social and Environmental Justice for All - through the lens of the Covid-19 Pandemic.

We have been aware, for some time, that climate change is the greatest existential crisis facing our global community. We have also been aware that it is a crisis which is disproportionately affecting the poorest regions across the world – those countries that, strangled by debt and often excluded from the benefits of science and technology, are deprived of the capacity to respond to the severe problems caused by emissions in the industrialised world.

Today, as we face together the unprecedented challenge of the coronavirus pandemic, it is once again our most vulnerable communities who are experiencing its most devastating effects. While Covid-19 is impacting on all our lives, that impact is not an equal one. For those who have been displaced or persecuted, who are the victims of natural disasters, who live in daily poverty in cramped and overcrowded conditions, deprived of clean water or an adequate health system, the threat of Covid-19 brings increased fears and poorer outcomes.

If we are to not only halt the spread of the virus, but prevent the economic collapse of the developing world and the spread of food insecurity to over a billion of our fellow global citizens, our response to the Coronavirus pandemic must be one of global co-operation — a response in which the phrase 'we are all in this together' is a truly generous one, encompassing all our vulnerable and marginalised global citizens.

UN International Day for the Eradication of Poverty is an important event on the global calendar. This year we join in solidarity, and in unprecedented circumstances, with those across the world who are impoverished, powerless and excluded.

I thank you for your great spirit of shared humanity and your determined pursuit of human rights for all our fellow global citizens.






All Together in Dignity (ATD) Ireland






Yola Hedge School & Family Centre

meetings.


